4C's of grading diamonds

If you are planning to buy diamond for the coming festival, there are 4 C's to keep in mind:

> Cut:



Diamond cuts is the foremost C to look upto, the more precise the cut is, more capitivating the diamond is to the eye.

Clarity:

Diamond clarity is a quality of diamonds relating to the existence and visual appearance of internal characteristics of a diamond called inclusions, and surface defects called blemishes. **Color:**

A chemically pure and structurally perfect diamond is perfect transparent with no hue, or color/ However, in reality almost no gem-sized natural diamondsare absolutely perfect.

Carat:

The carat is the diamond's physical weight measured in metric carats. One carat equals 1/5 gram and is sub-divided into 100 points. Carat weight is the most objective grade of the 4 C's.
