Round table on 'Government – Industry Partnership for a Skilled Workforce.'



The focus of the meeting was on the new reforms in National Apprenticeship Promotion Scheme (NAPS), corporate participation in WorldSkills Competitions and opportunities for hiring skilled workforce to achieve the objectives of the Skill India Mission.

The main objective of the project was to train 12,000 tribal rural women in Maharashtra with a focus of Self-sustainability, women entrepreneurship and E-commerce.

Project Vanika is GJSCI's flagship training program designed for skilling tribal rural women to make them self-reliant. It was initiated in March, 2016. In the pilot phase of the program, more than 1,000 tribal women have been trained.

Ruby

- Rubies, the birthstone of July, are considered the king of gems and represent love, health and wisdom. It was believed wearing a fine red Ruby bestowed good fortune on its owner. A Ruby is the most valuable gemstone and its value increases based on its color and quality.
- Ruby represents love, passion, courage and emotion. For centuries this gem has been considered the king of all gems. It was believed that wearing a fine red Ruby bestowed good fortune on its owner. Rubies have been the prized possession of emperors and kings throughout the ages. To this day the Ruby is the most valued gemstone.
- The color of a Ruby is the most important feature of the gemstone. Rubies are available in a range of red hues from purplish and bluish red to orange-red. The brightest and most valuable color of Ruby is often “a Burmese Ruby” – an indication that it is a rich, passionate, hot, full red color with a slight blue hue.
- The color is often referred to as “pigeon blood” red, a Ruby color only associated with the Mogok Valley mines in Myanmar. The color Pigeon Blood Ruby red, is not associated with the color of a pigeon's blood but rather the color of a white pigeon's eye.




What is micro pave setting?

The pavé setting, pronounced “pa-vay,” comes from the French word “to pave,” as in paved with diamonds. By closely setting small diamonds together with minimal visibility of the tiny metal beads or prongs holding the stones in place, the effect is one of continuous sparkle.

The jeweler typically drills holes into the ring, carefully places the diamonds into the holes, and finally forms tiny beads, or mini-prongs, around each diamond to secure them into the holes.

This setting is also known as a bead setting and in the case of especially small stones, may be called a micro-pavé setting. Diamonds are said to be pavé-set when they are as small as .01-.02 carats and any smaller than that would be called micro-pavé.
